Now that we have got the second full week of our new remote learning provision underway, I hope that you and your children feel settled into the new routine. Thank you to those parents who have sent me their thoughts and feedback - it seems that the introduction of a regular schedule and increase in live lessons have been well received. Clearly, we will continue to fine tune our provision as we gain more experience.

Of course, academic lessons are only part of what a school provides for it's pupils. We are all acutely aware that the children are missing each other and coming to school. I asked my own (Year 7) son this week what I could do to help him (he had missed a couple of lessons), and his response was, "I just want to go back to school".

Clearly, the emotional wellbeing of our children is of concern to us all. Whilst times are complicated and the majority of us aren't experts in mental health, parents might like to consider the following:

- 1. We have taken advice on how to support children through uncertain times and I have written about a number of themes that might be useful to think about at home in a blog post (Supporting our children though uncertain times). The four themes are: self-belief, building hope, being thankful and appreciating our connectedness. The article contains ideas for parents and children to pursue in each of these areas which you might find useful.
- 2. Monday sees the launch of this year's Children's Mental Health Week. You might want to watch Monday's assembly with your children which is on the theme of Express Yourself and contains ideas which you might find useful (provided to us by Children's Mental Health charity Place2Be).
- 3. As I wrote in last week's newsletter, please do make use of the flexibility which our timetable offers and feel you can step in if the day is not going well for your child.
- 4. Do communicate with us. Whilst we may not have a solution to hand, we will do what we can to help.
