"It is so good to know that our pupils appreciate the staff's hard work." This week I have enjoyed meeting with all of our Year 11 pupils, which is something I have always done, although this is the first time that our meetings have been virtual. I have been impressed by the overall positivity that our Year 11 demonstrated, even though for them, together with Year 13, the impact of coronavirus restrictions has been particularly harsh.

The Year 11 interviews traditionally follow the GCSE mock exams, and give me a chance to gauge how pupils feel they have done, and to establish whether the School is doing all it can to help them achieve their potential. It is also a time to ask about career aspirations. I always end these interviews by asking pupils if there is anything they would change about the School. The most common answer to this last question is 'nothing', usually followed by expressions of gratitude for their education. However, I make it clear that I am genuinely seeking to hear of any suggestions that they may have – after all, they are at the receiving end of the HCS education, and their perspective is important when considering future developments. Once a pupil asked me if I had ever sat in a Maths Department chair for 40 minutes. I had to admit I had not, and so at the next lesson observation I made sure to sit it out, and I quickly understood what they had meant. We changed the chairs for more comfortable versions.

Mr Blyth's survey of pupils' impressions of remote teaching has been really useful, and will lead to some changes to the way in which we deliver remote education. Over 150 pupils made many positive and generous comments about the efforts of the teaching staff, and they certainly raised my spirits. It is so good to know that our pupils appreciate the staff's hard work, and are prepared to say so, too. Bravo, pupils and bravo staff. **Mr Paul Smith, Headmaster**




Head of Art Miss Greenough has put together an <u>online</u> <u>exhibition of their work-in-</u> <u>progress pieces</u>.

Students use a block code editor to start such as 'BBC Micro-bits'. This then helps them develop their Python and Java skills, ensuring they are at the forefront of the coding movement.

Major Keating spoke about his time as a pupil at HCS and his experiences of being a cadet in the School's CCF. He covered his university days in York before presenting the highlights of working with the United Nations and his career in the British Army. He talked the Cadets though his experiences of officer selection, and officer training at Sandhurst. He spoke about his regiment and the countries where he has served with them, including Iraq. Pupils were able to pose their own questions to Major Keating at the end of the session. It was a great talk and our Cadets gained a lot from it.

David, who grew up in Hereford, has spent more than 15 years performing stunts in blockbuster movies and hit TV shows, ranging from the *Harry Potter* films and the forthcoming James Bond movie *No Time To Die*, to *Game of Thrones* and *Dr Who*. David was inundated with questions at the end of the session, proving that this guest was a hit.

Wednesday's popular session saw ITV news anchor Matt Teale speak about the highlights of his broadcasting career. He spoke to pupils about the best routes into the industry, the positive pressure of working in a newsroom, and memorable on-screen interviews.

On Thursday evening, 50-time England international and twotime Six Nations champion, Tom Wood, spoke to pupils about his life in Rugby Union. He spoke about playing at Northampton Saints and how rejection from England U18s gave him the drive and determination to succeed in his sporting career.

HOUSE COMPETITION: FINAL PHOTOGRAPHY RESULTS

Over 100 photographs were submitted for January's **House Photography <u>Competition</u>** and what an amazing collection they were. Eight independent judges (none of whom is attached to a House and for their security cannot be identified) were challenged with the very difficult task of deciding upon the ranks for the finalists and these were announced in last week's HCS at Home.

The process to decide the outcome for the overall House Photography Competition is a long and complicated one, but in a nutshell, the result was calculated using the following formula: *R*=*sum* (*ranks for finalists in each age category*) – *total number of photos submitted in each House* meaning that the House with the lowest number came out on top.
