




BOARDING

PHYSICS: EXOPLANETS LECTURE IS OUT OF THIS WORLD

Hereford Cathedral School Sixth Form Physics students were this week treated to a Zoom lecture by a leading academic in the field of physics and astronomy.

Dr Ingo Waldmann, who is Associate Professor in Extrasolar Planets at University College London, gave a detailed talk on exoplanets. In his lecture 'Searching for Earth 2.0', Dr Waldmann discussed how to find habitable planets using processes from big data to mass spectroscopy - and whether any have been found.

Year 12 Academic Scholar Seyi A, who, after attending an online lecture about exoplanets by Dr Waldmann in November, took it upon herself to invite the academic to deliver another lecture to her HCS peers. Seyi was encouraged to attend the original lecture thanks to Mr Hartley's Scholars Initiative, whereby Academic Scholars gather weekly to discuss current topics in their fields of interest.

Commenting on this week's lecture, Seyi said: "It was inspirational to see where the future of space exploration will take us in next few decades."

Hereford Cathedral School Head of Physics Mrs Cal Hendry said: "It was really interesting to get an insight into the current research work that is being done on exoplanets and the ongoing plans for research over the next 10 years, too."
