I hope you are all well, and that you and your children are in good spirits. Thank you to those of you who completed our recent online learning survey. Parents of 113 of our children took part and I was pleased by the overall finding – 90% of you agreed or strongly agreed that your child had had a good experience of remote learning so far. I should like to recognise the efforts of each of your children: their adaptability, resilience and acceptance of the situation. Let's not forget that in many ways they are bearing the brunt of the current crisis – unable to do something as everyday as play and giggle with friends, for example. What's more, I suspect that their spirits do an awful lot to cheer the rest of us up! Thank you too to you parents for all you have done and are continuing to do alongside your children to ensure that they are having the best possible experience of remote education. I should like also to pay tribute to the teaching staff who have adapted to a new way of working and who are endeavouring to do their best by our children, whilst looking after their own children and relatives, and whilst subject to the same worries and restrictions we are all facing.

Many of you made suggestions in your survey responses about how our online provision might be developed. We have combed through your suggestions, identifying common threads, and have passed these on to the teaching staff. We are, of course, keen to develop our practice to do the best possible job by the children. As you look to the school to respond to your suggestions, please bear in mind that often different parents express opposite views: more pressure vs less pressure, a longer school day vs a shorter one and so on. Incidentally, please do feel empowered as the adult who is working alongside your child to draw the line on a particular piece of work as you think best – the teachers will understand.

Some of you have expressed concern that the children are not covering as much of the curriculum as they would if they were in school. Please rest assured that, once we do return to school properly, we will all be working hard to catch up as necessary and that teachers will be aware of what the children have covered and what they have not. This is particularly pertinent for those moving to Year 7 – and of course we will be passing comprehensive records onto the Senior School. I would also reassure you that our children are clearly covering much more and remaining more engaged with their school work than many of their contemporaries.

Of course, following the government announcement on Sunday, we are now considering how some year groups might be able to return to school from 1 June. The prospect of reopening parts of the school in the near future presents significant challenges and may also impact on some of our existing online provision. Please look out for my email with more details.

Lastly, and most importantly, thank you to you all for your ongoing support of your children and of the school. We are continually buoyed up by your messages of support and by the work that you children are doing and by all they are achieving.




