



Throughout the year, HCJS pupils in Years 3 to 6 travel around playing sporting fixtures and tournaments against lots of other schools.

The schools include: The Elms, The Downs, Moor Park, Monmouth Girls, Monmouth Boys, King's St Albans, King's Hawford. RGS The Grange, Abberley Hall, King's Gloucester, Lucton, Malvern St James, Cheltenham College and Winterfold.
